WHAT HAPPENED AT NASHVILLE?

Monday, 30 May 2011. By Monday afternoon, nearly all of the 98 vets & 88 spouses had arrived & begun socializing in the Hospitality Room at the Gaylord Radisson Hotel. The Hospitality Room became the focal point because it was there that we renewed old friendships and made new acquaintances. Our past remembrances were triggered by the many volumes of radar site scrapbooks scattered throughout the room. Under the leadership of Fred Schulte, H-1, 62-63, Jerry May, H-1, 62-63, and Ron 'Papppy' Papworth, H-1, 62-63, the room was well stocked with the following: soda, beer, spirits, ice, munchies, and plenty of tall tales. The Registration package included free pens, classy nametags, and some promotional info about future reunions. That evening we were bused to the *Wildhorse Saloon* where we enjoyed an excellent barbeque buffet meal and took in a good country western show. Some folks left a little early & walked or rented a horse-drawn carriage for a tour around the heart of downtown Nashville.

Tuesday, 31 May 2011. On Tuesday morning, we assembled for our Breakfast Business Meeting. Before the food was served, several plaques were presented to key



members of the Hotel staff for their excellent work in hosting our reunion. After that, the posting of the colors, opening prayer, National Anthem, and introductory remarks were delivered by <u>Fred Schulte</u>, H-1, 62-63, <u>W. C. Chilton</u>, H-1, 62-63, <u>Reed Thomas</u>, H-4, 58-59, and <u>MC Larry Robin</u>, H-1, 64-65. Next, <u>Jerry Tonnell</u>, H-2, 1959, introduced our guest speaker, <u>Col Tom Garza</u>, and his wife Becky. Col Garza was the Commander of the 932nd from 1995-97. In his presentation, he highlighted the challenges of moving H-1 from Rockville to Keflavik while keeping both units operationally ready. He attributed that achievement to the men and women who manned the squadron during those trying times -- people he described as among the best in the USAF. Next, came the business meeting. David Hawk, H-1,

85-86, gave a detailed Treasurer's report. After that, nominations were received for all of the Executive Committee positions – a motion was made and passed to continue the present committee until our next meeting. This was followed by announcing the names of three "west-of-the-Mississippi" finalist locations for the 2013 Reunion: Oklahoma City, OK, Ogden, UT, and Laughlin, NV. In later discussions, another location, St Louis, MO, was proposed. <u>Rich Banta</u>, H-3, 1984, gave a briefing on the plans to establish a Radar Museum in Ohio. I'm sure we will see more on this in the future. The meeting ended and many retreated to the Hospitality Room and awaited the buses for the trip to the **Grand Ole Opry** for an excellent show -- a good time was had by all.

Wednesday, 1 June 2011. Once again, we boarded the buses, this time for a short trip to the river that turned out to be the highlight activity of the reunion. We stepped onto the 300-foot **General Jackson Riverboat**. We were serenaded by a joke-telling, guitar-playing twosome on the upper deck. Then we went down two decks to the grand ball room where we were thoroughly entertained by *Steve Hall and the Shotgun Red Band* – a group that demonstrated superb picking perfection. Wow! The meal that followed was first class in every sense. Before leaving, we gathered on the forecastle deck while <u>Connie Chick</u> took a group photo – when spliced together, it will be posted on our website. Finally, it was time for the end of a most successful reunion, as we said our goodbyes and bid fond farewells and departed for home on June the 2nd.

the more we hear of our members' deaths and illnesses. Let's pray we stay healthy so we can meet again soon.



SUBJECT: PODUNK CONTROL

The below account was received from Howard Sewell who was at H-3, in 1964. It demonstrates the complexity of intercepting Soviet aircraft as they tried to pass through our radar defenses.

"...There were three weapons controllers assigned to H-3. George Bowers was the Operations officer. Charlie Wilson and I were the other two assigned controllers. I believe in theory this gave us three people to cover the three shifts. Our call sign was Podunk Control. We operated out of what Charlie and I referred to as the world's darkest dark room. My recollection is of two surveillance scopes and two control scopes located on a mid-level dais. The top level provided space for a battle commander position along with a technician to manage activities. Down front we had a vertical plotting board but I don't recall it ever being in use. Normally we provided forward tell of significant aircraft activity to Ink spot control at H-1 from one of the surveillance positions. When needed, we provided control to fighters from the control scopes. I don't recall the nomenclature of the scopes, but they were about 15 inches in diameter and had a cursor to measure range and bearing."

"Things got real busy for our simple operation one summer morning in July 64. NATO was running a naval exercise in the north Atlantic called Teamwork. Several capital ships from the U.S. and allied nations were transiting the Faroe straits between the United Kingdom and Iceland.



Soviet Long Range Aviation was quite interested in the operation and flooded the exercise area with intelligence gathering aircraft such as the Bear Delta and the then new Bison. Several Badger series aircraft were also in the area."

"The Iceland Defense Force was responsible for detecting and identifying all aircraft entering the Icelandic Air Defense Identification Zone (ADIZ). Soviet aircraft were penetrating the ADIZ with regularity. Charlie called me very early this particular morning and asked me to come up to operations. George was on leave so Charlie and I were it as far as available weapons controllers were concerned. When I arrived Charlie had a flight of two F-102's on combat air patrol (CAP) just east of H-1. Two more were coming

airborne for my control out of Keflavik enroute for CAP. Over the ensuing ten to twelve hours, the 57th Fighter Interceptor Squadron launched what I remember to be on the order of twenty to twenty-five missions. This was a significant effort. As I recall they had a very small squadron of either twelve or sixteen deuces. So they had to launch and turn lots of fighters armed with 2.75 folding fin aerial rockets (FFAR'S) that day. It was a long haul for a single engine, subsonic fighter to get out east of Iceland. Keflavik was bearing 291 at 201 nautical miles from our radar site at H-3. From there they had to go another fifty to 125 miles out east of H-1 to engage the Soviet Reconnaissance aircraft. Our small force of radar operators was also maxed out. Practically every operator that we had worked around the clock during the exercise. Major J.C. Youngblood was the site commander. He manned the battle staff position continuously."

"My first intercept that day was on a Bear Delta as I recall. Charlie and I were both recently promoted First Lieutenants with maybe one hundred intercepts total experience between us, all of which were of the training variety. Needless to say I was somewhat excited and I suspect Charlie was also. It seems that the exercise went on within our limited radar coverage for more than one, perhaps as many as three days. During that period we recorded many intercepts versus our Cold War adversary. At the end of the exercise period I had over one hundred intercepts versus Soviet aircraft. I suspect Charlie had a similar or higher total. We finished the exercise with a great deal of satisfaction that we had performed our Cold War mission effectively."
