But to any of you who wish to get your late letters in to Santa, just address it to:SANTA Room -3, Able Team Barracks, Rockville, and I am sure he will get it.



Joel Grace intends to bring a herd of cattle from New Mexico up here to Rockville and have them graze in the "grasslands". Any cowhands available?





Till then, I remain --





WHATS A MOVIE WITHOUT POP-CORN

we all were on a liquid diet.


John was there with nothing to say but the words were on his face, Have a lot of fun tonight but, please don't wreck the place.
